### Public Schools the focus of new elective

Through a new class offered at Savage High School, students will have the opportunity to examine the public education system. The goal is to develop critical understanding of public education and the role of classroom teachers in today's public schools. This class is a newly offered elective taught by Ms. Henwood and funded through a grant received by MSU to give rural schools the opportunity to offer college credits. She is currently enrolled at Montana State University as a graduate student to fulfill the requirements of the grant. Ms. Henwood is looking forward to giving students, "the opportunity to receive discounted

college credits, to lighten student loan debt, and to give students the opportunity to function at a collegiate level of thinking." EDU 101 is a dual enrollment class, which means students will receive both a high school and three college credits when the class is completed at the end of semester one.

Students, like junior Tyler Lien, are also looking forward to the course. "I think this class will be a great opportunity to give us a look at the collegiate level. I am excited to learn about the public school's education system and all that goes into it. It has been going pretty well so far, but I am excited to dig a little deeper," she said.

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## Homecoming week is September 11-15

### Policy of the month focuses on absences

As the school year begins again, it is always good to keep in mind the school's absence policies. Please review the policy below. If you have any questions, please contact the school at 406-776-2317.

Absences fall into the following 3 categories:

- 1. Excused Absence- Absences that are excused by the student's parents or guardian by note for illness (which does not require hospitalization), family vacations, family hunting trips, scheduled medical appointments etc. *This does not mean the absence is waived, it still counts toward the number of allowed absences per semester.*
- 2. School-Related Absence- These absences will apply to a student's participation in Savage school athletic events, academic field trips, and other absences deemed curricular.
- 3. Waived absences
  - A) Subpoenas, to appear in court or court ordered, out-of-district placements for special services.
- B) Serious illness, family emergency, hospitalization or mental or physical. **Serious illness can be mental or physical, please contact administration if these situations are going to impact your child.** 
  - C) Bereavement of an immediate family member (father, mother, brother, sister, or grandparent).

Life often presents us with the unexpected and Savage School wants to assist you in those times, but we can only help if we know the circumstances.

REMINDER- If a note is not presented to the office within 5 days following the absence, it will be marked unexcused and a grade reduction will be applied to your child's grade.
